FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

Role and Responsibilities

- The Prime Minister of Canada heads the federal government based in Ottawa.
- The federal government's responsibilities are listed in the Constitution Act, 1867.
 Examples include postal service, banking, national defence, employment insurance, and criminal law.

How to Find and Access Your Representative

- Canadians are represented in the federal government by a Member of Parliament ("M.P.")
- Each M.P. has a constituency office, which is an office in the community that the public can access.
- To find who your M.P. is and contact information, you can enter your postal code at: www.ourcommons.ca/Members.

Services For You

- M.P.'s can assist you with:
 - o Immigration and Citizenship;
 - Canada Pension;
 - Old Age Security;
 - Income Supports (E.I., CPP, CPP-D, Disability Tax Credit);
 - Social Insurance Numbers; and
 - COVID-19 Emergency Supports

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT

Role and Responsibilities

- Premiers are the head of the provincial/territorial governments.
- Responsibilities for the provinces/territories are listed in the Constitution Act, 1867. Examples include education, health care, regional transportation, labour regulations, and municipalities.

How to Find and Access Your Representative

- In Ontario, everyone is represented by a Member of Provincial Parliament ("M.P.P.") at the Ontario Legislative Assembly.
- M.P.P.'s also have constituency offices to service their community.
- To find who your M.P.P. is and contact information, you can enter your full address at: www.ola.org/en/members.

Services For You

- M.P.P.'s can assist you with:
 - Health Cards and OHIP Issues;
 - Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP) and Trillium Drug Program;
 - Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP) and Student Grants; and
 - o Driver's Licence

MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT

Role and Responsibilities

- Mayors head cities, towns, or townships, which are types of municipalities.
- Municipalities receive authority to make decisions from the provincial government.
 Examples of their responsibilities include libraries, parks, community water systems, local police and fire services, and roadways.

How to Find and Access Your Representatives

- Most cities and towns in Ontario have a mayor and councillors.
- The mayor serves the entire city or town. Councillors serve smaller regions within a city or town.
- To find your mayor and councillor, you can visit your municipality's website and search for the section about the local council.

Services For You

- Your City/Town Councillor is your local representative and can assist you with:
 - o By-law Enforcement;
 - Local Roads and Snow Removal;
 - Noise Complaints;
 - Ontario Works (Social Assistance);
 - Property Taxes;
 - Recreation Services;
 - o Police and Fire Service Inquiries; and
 - Land Use and Development
